What is Safeguarding?

- All of the adults around you think that your health, safety and welfare are very important.
- At our school, we respect all children and adults, and help to protect their rights.
- We teach you how to recognise risks in different situations and how to help protect yourself and stay safe.

How does Gordon Primary School work to keep you safe?

- We provide a safe environment for you to learn.
- Staff want to help to ensure you and your friends keep safe, at home as well as school.
- We think it is important for you to know where to get help if you are worried or unhappy about something.
- We teach you how to keep yourself, and others, safe and to recognise risks in different situations. Our lessons and assemblies help you learn about things like healthy eating, online safety, road safety, relationships and bullying.
- We sometimes work with other people, such as the NSPCC and the local police, to help teach you these things.

What should you do if you are worried about something?

- You can speak to any adult in school, they will always listen to you.
- Miss Naidoo is the adult in charge of Safeguarding. Her main role is to keep you safe.
- Ms Rogers, Ms Jones, Ms Kambo and Mrs Gracia-Thomas are also part of the Safeguarding team.
- You can email **childprotection@gordonpri.uk** from home or school.
- You can place a note in the Worry Box in class and an adult will arrange to meet with you.
- Use the '*Speak Out, Stay Safe*' display in the Key Stage 1 Hall, to find out more about strategies that you can use to stay safe.

What happens next?

- When we know you or your friends are worried or feeling unsafe, the adults will do everything they can to make things better for you or your friends.
- Sometimes adults may need to speak to one of the safeguarding team.
- If you email or message – someone will message you back when school is open.
- Sometimes they may need to contact other people who support children and families.
